



Proposition No. 1 Public Safety Levy

The Sedro-Woolley City Council adopted Ordinance 1927-19 concerning a proposition to provide for continuous police services. This proposition would increase the City's regular property tax rate by \$0.5602 to a total authorized rate of \$2.50 per \$1,000 of assesed value for collection in 2020 and exempting all eligible senior citizens and disabled low income persons from this increase as allowed under RCW 84.36.381. The maximum allowable levy in 2020 shall serve as the base for subsequent levy limitations as provided by RCW 84.55.050.
