COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT)



CERT training teaches skills that people can use to safely help while waiting for responders.

About CERT...

BACKGROUND:

We know that police and fire emergency services may not be available to meet all the immediate needs of the public following a major disaster. We also know that many people will spontaneously volunteer to help others until professional responders arrive. This was the case following the 1988 Mexico City earthquake where untrained, spontaneous volunteers saved 800 people.

Unfortunately, about 100 people lost their lives while attempting to save others simply because they were not trained to assess the dangers in a postearthquake environment.

CERT is about personal preparedness and being able to assist others until help arrives.

The CERT training is 21 to 24 hours long and is delivered in three-hour sessions, one evening a week over an eight-week period.
