Background and Overview

The new initiative process was developed as part of the six-year EMS levy budget that began in 2019. The EMS Department budgets an annual \$100,000 which is earmarked for EMS new initiatives. This funding is intended to provide an avenue for the EMS Physician Medical Program Director (MPD) to implement new clinical initiatives to improve overall pre-hospital patient care in Skagit County. Some examples of previous new initiatives include: the implementation of the i-Gel® supraglottic airway (to replace the King LT) in 2019 and the vacuum spine board for spinal motion restriction in 2020.

In the event there are no MPD new initiatives in a given budget year, or there is a portion of new initiative funds remaining after the implementation of an MPD new initiative, an application process will be opened to licensed Skagit County EMS agencies

New initiative applications will be accepted for the purpose of improving overall pre-hospital patient care in Skagit County through projects related to: education and training, decreasing patient mortality and morbidity; or improving the effectiveness of existing prehospital activities or services.

According to RCW 70.168.130 (1) and (2), the Washington State Department of Health provides disbursement of funds to regional emergency medical services and trauma care councils. *~Part of the funds budgeted by the North Region EMS & Trauma Care Council are for an Annual Community Based Training (CBT) Grant.*

Grants are awarded to Prehospital Agencies, within the North Region, to support community-based prehospital education. Available grants will also be awarded to applications that enhance existing quality of prehospital activities or services, decrease patient mortality and morbidity; or expand the extent, size or number of existing prehospital activities or services.

In an effort to best serve North Region communities, grants will be assessed and awarded based on need and benefit to the Region. Applicants must coordinate application approval through their County EMS Council or their Agency.

Grants will be reviewed according to the Regional Council's Grant Criteria and approval will be based on the overall benefit to the Region. Depending on the number of and types of requests in the grant submissions, the Regional Council may fund different amounts per county. Funding will be prioritized based on participation in the North Region Council.

<p>Description: Skagit County EMS transport agencies have identified a trend in challenges related to safely transporting critically ill or injured pediatric patients in ambulances. There is not currently a standard for pediatric transport equipment in ambulances in the county. This project will allow us to group purchase and place two different pediatric restraint devices on each 911 emergency transport ambulance in the county. 1) A Ferno NeoMate (infants 7 – 14 lbs) and (2) a Ferno Pedi-Mate+ (children 10 – 100 lbs) with a spare device per agency. These devices are consistent with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Working Group Best-Practice Recommendations for the Safe Transportation of Children in Emergency Ground Ambulances and approved by the Skagit County EMS Medical Program Director. Skagit County EMS will provide matching funds as well as develop and implement training on the equipment.</p>
