March 30th: Hunting, Fishing, and Native Sovereignty – Northwest treaty rights continue to be frequently discussed in communities and courtrooms. In his talk, Yakama hunter and fisherman Aaron Paul Whitefoot discusses the history and tensions that linger from the Treaty of 1855.

May 18th: Fish Wars: Tribal Rights, Resistance, and Resiliency in the Pacific Northwest – In the 1960s and 70s, tribes throughout the PNW launched protests and acts of civil disobedience to pressure the government to recognize their fishing rights. Lessons from these events remain relevant today. In this talk, professor Kestrel Smith surveys the evidence and events before and after the Fish Wars.
