b. Noxious Weed Coordinator Report

Landowner Rights-of-Entry

One Major project we are working on this season is renewing our landowner agreements for knotweed and Spartina control. For the continued support and control of Japanese knotweed we found the need to renew all of our landowner agreements. This will hopefully be culminated into a working list of participants that would help with turnover and continuity and overall transparency.

Hiring

Hiring for the 2019 seasonal crew was a little harder than normal. We had to extend the application date two weeks but we did end up getting seven applications for the weeds aid position, five for the Technician position and three for the Coordinator Position. After the selection processes we hired Alexandra Simpson as the coordinator. Alexandra Simpson has been a part of our seasonal crew since 2017 and is a great leader and has a lot of knowledge about our programs. Tia Myers was also selected, Tia Worked with WDFW last year in their Noxious weed crew and also has a vast knowledge of our programs and invasive species in general. And lastly we hired Camille Morris an Eastern Washington University student and local to Skagit County as our Weed Aid. We did offer additional positions to other candidates but due to competition and a weaker employee pool we were unable to fill any additional positions.

Northern State

Yellow Flag Iris Control at Northern State Pond. We will be working with the City of Sedro Woolley Skagit County and the Skagit Steelhead Club to control Yellow Flag Iris and Purple Loosestrife on the pond at northern state. This is a recreational pond used for annual derbies and is currently being dredged. Sedro Woolly provided chemicals and the Steelhead club assisted cutting seed heads and spraying the area. Yellow Flag iris is a noxious weed due to its ability to outcompete and clog up irrigation canals and lakes and streams. The plant itself can cause photo burns and overall decreases the health of a enclosed water system.

Anacortes Ferry Terminal

Cooperated with the Sarah Tchang Port of Skagit in removing Poison Hemlock at the ferry terminal. The Port of Skagit sent 2 employees to help me for two days pulling and cutting poison hemlock. Our initial plan was to do a chemical treatment but we ended up being rained out and had to continue with Mechanical Control.

Big Lake LMD

Planning a Community Educational event for Big Lake to educate landowners on Riparian noxious weeds as well as aquatic weeds and how to identify and control them. Since there is already a LMD for the lake we will be partnering with Tracy Alker to have door hanger and pamphlets to help raise awareness and inspire private control of noxious weeds to overall improve the LMD past the property owners that are adjacent to the water.

Skagit River CWMA Expansion

We plan on expanding our current scope of work to the upper watersheds of the Skagit River. We will be working with the WCC and the Skagit CWMA to control all county properties downstream of the Sauk river confluence towards concrete. As a part of this expansion we will need to send individual landowners letters and have community meeting to gain overall support for our program but also to increase our transparency to open up more agreements in the future.

Fir Island Mill Town Cooperative work

We will be working with WSDA, Snohomish County, WDFW and WCC to survey and treat Spartina from Milltown towards the Camano Island Bridge. This is part of an ongoing cooperative efforts through our state grant to control Spartina in Skagit Bay. Since in Skagit County our densities are relatively low it is important we assist our neighboring counties to ensure there isn't any transportation of propagules with the tide into our areas.

SFEG/ Phillips 66

Skagit River Float with Phillips 66 and Skagit Fisheries Enhancement Group. We were asked to join SFEG and Phillips 66 on a Skagit river float that would show the interested parties our overall work area and the differences between treated and untreated areas. We were there to provide history and support since Phillips 66 currently funds some of our CWMA projects and are interested in looking at additional programs to work with.

Poison Hemlock

Poison Hemlock and Canada thistle seem to be a bigger concern for Skagit County residents. Other the years I have notice an increase in not only calls but the abundance of large populations. This is something we will continue to address and put more efforts towards in the beginning of the season.

Some larger populations of Thistle that we have sent letters to the landowner are on Avon Allen Rd and Mclean and Memorial Highway

Chemical Spill on Cook Rd.

We assisted the Skagit County Roads and Natural Resource division with a chemical spill on Cook rd. 3 gallons of Iminopludalid fell off a truck and was washing into a catch basin and a field. Once we got on site we realized how extensive the spill as and made sure everyone was wearing PPE and assisted with the overall clean up. The initial responders didn't have access to the spill trailer and only had sorbent pads for oils which was not working with the water soluble insecticide. We managed to contact the appropriate agencies and transferred all the Waste material to the hazardous material to the transfer station. After this spill we had a meeting with Risk management to debrief and discussed the need to have more HAZWOPER certified individuals at the county to help deal with spills like this in the future. Due to the lack of expedient response personal we found it important to have trained staff to deal with other small spills in the future.

Public Map Viewer

King County has a Map now where landowners can pin noxious weed populations and then the King County employee's monitor the wed map and respond to different noxious weed populations. They also track the progress of control for those populations as well.

Enforcement Training

Currently our enforcement process includes responding to or surveying a noxious weed population. Then I produce a letter of enforcement including data collected, pictures, pamphlets and contact information for the noxious weed control board. Then the landowner has the responsibility to either control the weeds or contact our office to discuss the noxious weed population and what steps should be taken to ensure control. Due to a lack of availability monitoring those properties after the date of notification is limited so no further action has been taken. Increased board involvement and additional staff would allow more time for the coordinator to be time sensitive and contract or enforce control on a specific property. The overwhelming majority of landowners control their population or make plans for control with the first letter of violation. On Rainy days where our crews can do control work I have them drive around specific regions of Skagit county and record noxious weed populations.

d. 2019-2021 WSDA Biennium Budget Request

Our WSDA Knotweed Solicitations were approved awarding us \$25,000.00 for the 2019-2020 biennium. This is to be distributed \$10,000.00 for 2019 and \$15,000.00 for 2020. Additional funds may be available in the 2nd year of the biennium.

Our WSDA Solicitation also was approved and we were awarded \$75,000 for the 2019-2020 biennium. For 2019 WSDA would like us to use \$35,000.00 and use \$40,000.00 in 2020. Since WSDA's aquatic noxious weed program was cut drastically the amount available has decreased. To combat this decrease in budget we have moved some of our equipment rentals and Phone services to allow for more funds to be used for wages. There are also additional funds that can be requested during the second biennium.

e. 2020 Skagit County Budget

With the additional of our supplemental budget our overall budget request is just over \$222,000.00. We have mentioned the additional position to the commissioners before and they seem to be receptive and understandings that our program needs additional staff to facilitate all the functions of a county weed board while sustaining various grant funded programs. This additional position request is in response to the annual turnover that cripples the effectiveness of our grant programs and overall decreases the amount of time available for the noxious weed coordinator to perform their job.

It's important to not only hire well but to ensure that the benefits and compensation are adequate to ensure that we don't lose people to other jobs. Once you are able to find a good staff pool then the revolving door will stop and the programs will improve.

To compensate the additional budget strain we will be removing the weed aid positions and moving the other positions into a Technician Structure to allow for more flexibility with wages based on people skills, education and experience

In the future to help release pressure on the general fund it may be advisable to explore a special assessment for noxious weed control. With the current growth of our program it would be adventitious to put funding systems in place that are stable and can provide long term funds for noxious weed control. This would require a lot of community engagement and a lot of future meetings and exploration but if successful would be instrumental in creating a sustainable strong noxious weed board in the future. If an assessment was approved it would be a Tax on individual parcels and then an additional fee set for the amount of acreage on said parcel. Making sure the agricultural community is represented would be an integral part of our exploratory process.

g. Board Member Training Certification

Having Kevin Hupp come over and go over enforcements with the board. Kevin has been doing enforcements in his county for many years and has a lot of great knowledge and skills that could help our board improve their enforcement program. Overall Board needs OPMA and PRA Training.

h. Brassica Ordinance

Brassica ordinance was approved and added to SCC. There was a lot of support from the brassica growers to provide additional avenues for resolving cross pollination concerns with regards to commercial and private production of Brassica products. The WSDA had various comments about how the ordinance is written and how it may actually limit the ability to carry out the functions of the ordinance. Specifically they mention that "Adjacent properties" is not specific enough since cross pollination can occur for distances over a mile. Additionally there are concerns about the overall process requiring the landowner to notify potential growers before a growing season

i. Grant Expenditure Change

Two slight changes to the 2019 budget would be that we will be taking on the equipment charge for our second truck as well as phones to allow for more of our budget to go towards wages. This was in response and by request by the WSDA since their overall state budget decreased.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

a. Glyphosate At Skagit County Public Works

There has been an increase in the amount of phone calls and public concern about the use of Herbicides on our roadways and for other aspects of public works and parks. Glyphosate has been a big topic and has been getting a lot of negative feedback. There are discussions about finding alternatives as well as changing some of our procedures to allow for less indiscriminate spraying on roadsides and public lands while still retaining our ability to control noxious weeds.

For our Spartina Program we were awarded 75,000 for the 2019-2021 biennium. 35,000 for 2019-2020 and 40,000 for 2020-2021. All Together there was a general decrease in the amounts awarded by WSDA.

Expenditure Comments

Since some of the grants have seen a decrease in availability partners were asked to take on more of the secondary costs for the grant. Skagit County is now going to charge vehicle 8123 to our general fund for an extra burden of 2209\$. Additionally we took over iPhone payments and replacements. This combined with the truck in ER&R is roughly 6000\$ to be charged to General Fund. The idea being that although the budget decreased we will still be able to provide our seasonal workers with the same amount of hours. We also expect to have more hours billed to general fund for expansion of some of our Noxious Weed Specific Projects. Overall the budget looks to be on track as most of the budget will be exhausted closer to the 3rd quarter monitoring report.
