What is a Shoreline Master Program?

An SMP is a set of policies and regulations required by state law that has three basic principles:

- Protect the environmental resources of state shorelines
- Promote public access and enjoyment opportunities
- Give priority to uses that require a shoreline location

Still must:

- •Protect Critical Areas
- •Ensure No Net Loss of Ecological Functions
- •Encourage preferred uses





Where does an SMP apply?

- 1. Applies to "Shorelines of the State," which are waterbodies that meet certain criteria
 - Marine Shorelines
 - Lakes equal to or greater than 20 acres
 - Watercourses with a mean annual flow greater than 20 cubic feet per second
- 2. 200 feet landward of the ordinary high water mark
- 3. Also includes shoreline associated wetlands, floodways, and up to 200 feet of floodplain when contiguous with the



Achieving No Net Loss of Ecological Functions




SKAGIT SHORELINE COUNTY PROGRAM

- Existing and planned land use








Key SMP Issues Addressed in 2016 PC draft

- 1. Non-conforming Uses/Structures
- 2. Overwater Structures (piers/docks)
- 3. Shoreline Armoring
- 4. Buffers and Setbacks
- 5. Vegetation Conservation
- 6. CAO integration










What is an SMP periodic update?

- 1. The state requires all SMPs to be reviewed every eight years
- 2. Periodic review is intended to keep SMPs current with:
 - Amendments to state law (WAC, RCW)
 - Consistency with Ecology's periodic review checklist
 - Changes in local plans and regulations
 - Consistency with Comp Plan and development regulations
 - New or improved data and information
 - Consistency with latest Ecology guidance, science, and other improvements to the SMP's overall use and function



The SMP periodic review will not:

- Re-evaluate the ecological baseline which was established as part of the comprehensive update
- 2. Extensively assess no net loss criteria other than to ensure that any additional proposed amendments do not result in degradation of the baseline condition





Anticipated Amendments to 2016 draft

- Elements from the periodic review
 - E.g. review of exemption thresholds, definitions, WAC consistency
- Formatting adjustments to align policy sections
- Addition of hyperlinks to improve electronic use
- Addresses Planning Commission recommendations in the recorded motion
- Addresses Ecology comments to address consistency with WAC requirements
- Integration of most current CAO
- Complete listing of waterbodies to be included





Expected Timeline

- Complete draft of SMP amendments since 2016 (Jan 2021)
- Online Open House (Jan 2021)
- Planning Commission review and recommendation (Jan Mar 2021)
- Public comment period and public hearing (Mar Apr 2021)
- Local adoption of the SMP (May Jun 2021)

All dates are tentative
