New VSP Inter Local Agreement

- Three new projects two hedgerows and one HUAP
 - Wesen: What is the timeline on spending the funds?
 - Blake: One planting season
- Blake: Not enough funding available to fill number of possible projects
 - o Roozen: Plantings are a good use of money if the plants are available
 - Blake: There is \$1.3 million available this year for seedlings, but it is a space issue for nurseries.
 - Roozen: Perhaps there is a possibility to get landowner participation in helping grow the seedlings.

Skagit VSP Updates

New Watershed Group Members

- Two new members were chosen, and they will be around for the next meeting.
 - Schwab: We should maintain a diversity of people on the Group
 - Blake: Are there other VSP groups that we can learn from regarding their Watershed Group composition?
 - Roozen: Ever county is different in how they implement VSP, it might be worthwhile to delve into the Watershed Group members at the Commission level.
 - Wesen: Some Watershed Groups cover multiple counties. It is important to adapt as we see fit for our needs.

Open Discussion / Questions

- Wesen: There is a need to increase public outreach.
 - Blake: We may look to the NOAA change detection process as a way to reach out to individuals on the ground.
 - Wesen: Clean Samish is a good example of how relationship building can be done.
 - Roozen: Peer-to-peer outreach is key.
 - Wesen: We should talk to other organizations that do it well.
 - Schwab: Video content can have a major impact, and should be used to increase public awareness.
 - Blake: Videos can be posted on Conservation District's new Youtube.
 - Roozen: there are folks at the Commission available to help.
- Wesen: Emmett mentioned the hedgerow planting, how long will the hedges take to provide cover?
 - Wild: Three to five years.
 - Wild: They are non-riparian in this case, but help with soil and wind erosion.
 - Wesen: Hedges might be a good thing for property owners to understand more about.
