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SKAGIT DREDGE GIVEN SPECIAL **CONSIDER ATION**

Army Head Approves Bill For Special Survey Of North, South Forks

SHRAUGER REPORTS

Bone, Schwellenbach, Wallgren Give Utmost to Secure Results For Flood Control

Indications that Skagit county's proposed river dredge for Puget Sound rivers will receive favorable consideration from the federal government were apparent this week, following special conferences held in Washington, D. C., by Postmast-er C. F. Shrauger with local congressmen, senators, and war department officials.

Shrauger, who returned from the national capital Tuesday, appeared optimistic concerning the dredge project. "We know we have the full cooperation of Congressman Wallgren and Senator Schwellenbach," he told an Argus report-er this morning. "The final approv-al of the project depends on the results of a survey by the war department."

Senate bills authorizing the war department to make a survey of the Skagit have been introduced by Senator Schwellenbach, it was

"Mr. Shrauger left Seattle by plane at 9:15 p. m. April 22, ariving in Washington, D. C., April 3, at 6:40 p. m., immediately conacting Congressman Wallgren. "Through the efforts of Congressman Wallgren, a meeting was arranged with General Pillsbury of the United States engineers un-der the War Department to secure the approval of this department, who has charge of rivers and harbors as they pertain to flood control and navigation.

"General Pillsbury, who is fa-

miliar with the Skagit problem, expressed the opinion that this project as outlined was feasible. The result of this conference with the War Department was the introduction of a bill for an immediate survey of the North and South fork of the Skagit river for the purpose of determining the cost in order to present a bill to dredge.
"Congressman Wallgren, who is

a third ranking member of the flood control committee in congress, appeared before his commit-

tee and secured their approval.
"A conference was held with Senators Bone and Schwellenbach, who had been quite concerned with flood control conditions in the Puget Sound country. They approved this project as a solution to flood control and navigation on the Skagit river. Senator Bone stated he would introduce a companion bill in the senate if this became necessary."

Mason has been assured of the full support of both our senators and the congressmen and is very much pleased with the result of Shrauger's trip and the accomplishments of the Dredging associ-
